


# Wallabadah Public School Annual School Report 2013




## Student information

# **School performance 2013**

The school and our students have achieved "great things" throughout 2013. There have been achievements at a high standard academically, on the sporting field, creatively and in community service endeavours.



## **Academic achievements**

#### **NAPLAN**

In the National Assessment Program, the results across the Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 literacy and numeracy assessments are reported on a scale from Band 1 to Band 10.

The achievement scale represents increasing levels of skills and understandings demonstrated in these assessments.

Year 3: from Band 1 (lowest) to Band 6 (highest for Year 3)

Year 5: from Band 3 (lowest) to Band 8 (highest for Year 5)

No students in Years 3 or 5 last year fell below the minimum standards in either Literacy or numeracy.

As we only had two students in Year 3 comparisons could not be made with the state and previous years, however the children achieved Band 3 in Numeracy.






# NAPLAN Year 5 - Literacy








#### NAPLAN Year 5 - Numeracy

# Significant programs and initiatives


At our school students learn in a stimulating and challenging environment and are encouraged to reach their full potential.

- Revise Professional Teaching Standards measuring own performance against 7 elements
- Promotion of technology as an important learning tool for students to further develop skills in numeracy.

# School priority 3

#### Outcome for 2012-2014

To be recognised as a "Small school with BIG opportunities", engendering a culture of being a "caring family" A school with professionally competent teachers engaged in seeking ways to improve student learning outcomes.

## 2014 Targets to achieve this outcome include:

- To increase the number of online training hours undertaken by the school's learning support team from 2013 baseline figure.
- Increased circulation of our newsletter within the wider community

#### Strategies to achieve these targets include:

- Leadership and management ensures that opportunities are available for every student.
- Expectation that teachers are professional, accountable and meet the needs of students through strengthening their own teaching skills & approach.



# **Professional learning**

Professional development is seen as an integral part of the School Plan. Resources are utilised ensuring that activities are worthwhile and that they are reflected in the School Plan.

Staff value opportunities to share ideas with other teachers in their Stages, therefore meetings with our neighbouring schools are considered valuable. It is envisaged that stronger links will be forged with Willow Tree P.S. in Professional Development opportunities such as fortnightly Staff meetings.

This year most of the Professional Development was done with regard to the implementation of English in 2014 and it was done either out of school hours or during Release time.

Professional Development included:

- Instructional leadership meetings
- English curriculum
- Disability Standards
- Every Student, Every School conference
- Small Schools Conference
- Principal conferences and meetings

Two Staff Development days were held at Werris Creek and Willow Tree Schools for implementation of English syllabus.

# Parent/caregiver, student, and teacher satisfaction

In 2013, the school sought the opinions of parents, students and teachers about the school.

Their responses are presented below.

All parents felt Wallabadah was a happy and safe school were class activities are interesting and engage students in learning.

95% agree that Wallabadah is a school where parents and carers are encouraged to be involved in their child's learning and where teachers and families work in partnership to support student learning and information about the school's programs and activities is regularly communicated.

100% of parents agree that our school is a place where positive relationships exist between the school and wider community and the wider community actively supports events to celebrate the schools achievements.

Students felt that their teachers are fair to them and care about their education and progress.

08% of students interviewed enjoy school, what they do each day in class and generally have a lot of fun at school.

Parents felt that promotion of the school through the local paper was very effective. Feedback from the community about our student learning experiences and the extra curricula activities children were involved in was also favourable.

# **Background**

All areas of Human Society and it's environment are taught at Wallabadah Public.

#### **Findings and conclusions**

Human Society and it's environment is taught in all classes each week. Parents felt well informed about the teaching of HSIE through regular contact with class teachers either informally or at Parent Teacher interviews. One parent mentioned that the liked to see student work printed in the Wallaby Newsletter. All parents expressed a desire to assist and support the school in HSIE and saw that their children were developing many new skills and strategies through their studies.

Staff enjoy teaching HSIE in the classroom and feel that the resources support their endeavours. From our class discussion in Term 4 Teachers noted that students felt happy being involved in HSIE experiences and see it an important study, particularly learning about current events. One senior child said "I particularly like BTN because it explains what's happening in the news in a way I understand"

#### **Future directions**

The evaluation of Human Society and it's environment has identified some areas of action.

- Revise and update resources in units.
- Create links with outside organisations to support work done in the classroom.
   Eg Online museum links, Powerhouse website and Antarctic website.
